

Food Allergy in New Zealand

Prevalence and patterns in NZ

- 10% doctor-diagnosed with allergies at age 2 years, mainly to milk, eggs and peanuts
- Reduces to 5% by adolescence.
- Mainly peanuts, tree-nuts, fish & shellfish in older children, adults
- Sesame and kiwifruit increasingly common in NZ
- Milk, soy and wheat allergies recognised as complex to manage.



Community Inequities?

2016 : Adult food-induced anaphylaxis hospital presentations in New Zealand

• 1.7 fold increase 2002-2011, mainly attributable to a disproportionate increase in rates in the Pacific Island population.

• During the period reviewed, rate per 100 000 people rose from 6.0 to 20.6 (more than 3-fold) for Pacific people, compared with 3.5 – 5.2 for New Zealand Europeans.

Community Inequities cont'd?

2017: Paediatric food-induced anaphylaxis

- **2.8-fold increase** in the overall annualised rate for the 10-year period 2006 2015
- Admission rates significantly higher among Asian and Pacific children than Maori and NZ European children.
- Where the trigger food was documented (67.7% of cases),
 - nuts (48%), specifically **peanuts (26%)**, were the most commonly reported allergen
 - followed by cow's milk (21%).

Why?

- NZ has a very different population mix
- Further change in recent years due to high migration levels.
- Migration itself is considered a risk factor for the development of allergies,
 - And there are indications of higher levels of Food Allergy in NZ's Asian and Pacific communities (Migrant communities), than in NZ European or Māori.
- At the same time, many Māori and Pacific whānau (families) are more likely to be living in socially and economically stressed communities.

NZ's Population Blend


New Zealand Population by Major Ethnic-Origin Group, 2018





NZ Age Distribution of Pacific, Māori & Asian (2018)


Pacific People in NZ by Age


Information overload in formal English

 - le. Not parents or children
- Select a large diverse NZ school campus
 - Manurewa High School
 - High percentage of Māori & Pacific Island families
- Engage, collaborate and refine guidelines
- Transition allergy messaging to align with visual and linguistic cues for Maori, Pacific & Asian student families.

- SSHT has the necessary transition & delivery resource


